1. Introduction

Gender remains one of the greatest equal opportunities concerns of contemporary society. Female advancement, women's liberation, and equal employment of women and men are galvanizing ways of eradicating poverty and social inequity, enhancing economic development, and improving women's health standards toward the formation of a sound, prosperous, and socially appropriate demographic. These efforts are indeed part and parcel of what is required in so-called sustainable development. In the recent past gender equity is also amplifying a voice to stand up against oppression or exploitation of a transgender persons. This calls for an effective Gender policy to avoid any form of discrimination and ensure fairness in the provision of employment opportunities for the staff, which will depend on the active involvement of each member of staff.

The core values of Chopra Kamala Paul Smriti Mahavidyalaya are as follows: It will strive to provide and promote fair and socially just treatment to all employees, students, and other stakeholders who are or will be associated with the institution. - NSS Unit: While there is no separate wing for girls, the NSS unit consistently encourages girls to take on social responsibilities.
- Library Access: The college library ensures equal access for female students.
- Girls Common Room: Located on the ground floor, this room is equipped with a Sanitary Napkin.
- Separate Washrooms: Each floor has separate washrooms for female students, facility is available in the college.

These measures are part of the college's ongoing efforts to create an environment where all students can thrive with dignity and mutual respect.

2. Objectives of Gender Audit

The Gender Audit report is an important document that can be used for the evaluation of Chopra Kamala Paul Smriti Mahavidyalaya in adhering to equal rights of both genders and fostering gender sensitive environment. The objectives of this report are:

- Identify Gender Gaps: To identify any existing gender disparities or gaps in various aspects of college life, such as enrolment, academic performance, participation in extracurricular activities, leadership roles, and access to resources.
- Evaluate Policies and Practices: To review and assess the effectiveness of current
 policies, practices, and programs related to gender equality. This involves analysing
 how well the institution's policies are implemented and their impact on promoting a
 gender-sensitive environment.
- 4. Promote Gender Equality: To formulate recommendations for promoting gender equality within the institution. This includes suggesting new initiatives, revising existing policies, and introducing practices that foster an inclusive and supportive environment for all genders.

- 7. Facilitate Inclusive Growth: To ensure that both male and female students have equal opportunities for growth and development. This includes assessing the participation of girls and boys in various activities and making necessary adjustments to support inclusive growth.
- 8. Strengthen Support Systems: To strengthen the support systems in place for addressing gender-related issues. This involves evaluating the effectiveness of committees such as the Anti-Ragging Committee and the Women Cell and suggesting ways to enhance their roles.
- 9. Legal and Ethical Compliance: To ensure compliance with national and international legal standards related to gender equality by addressing ethical considerations in implementing and monitoring gender-related policies and practices.

3. Methodology adopted in gender audit

The methodology employed in conducting the Gender Audit for Chopra Kamala Paul Smriti Mahavidyalaya during the academic years 2018-2023 is systematic and comprehensive. The report was done based on statistical gender data collected for the academic year 2018-2023. This analysis was made on the numbering data about the student strengths, department wise compilation showing male to female ratio on the basis of caste composition and gender-wise distribution. The following methods had been utilized for collecting the data for gender audit report:

- Desk review: Collect and analyse quantitative data on gender representation in student registration, faculty and staff.
- Surveys: Conduct surveys with students, faculty, and staff to gather perceptions on gender equality, safety, and inclusion on campus
- Focus group discussions: Hold focus group discussions with diverse stakeholders to gain deeper insights on gender dynamics and challenges.
- 4. Observation: Observe campus facilities, events, and interactions to assess the gender-friendliness of the environment

4. Observations made during Gender Audit

During the audit process we have identified some noticeable observations or the key areas to focus upon, and some of them are as under:

The number of female students is increasing year on year in each category.

 Examining the integration of gender considerations into the college's policies, decision-making processes, and governance structures.

 Reviewing the availability and effectiveness of support services such as counselling, mentoring, health services, and extracurricular activities in addressing the specific needs of different genders.

 Assessing the adequacy and accessibility of campus facilities, as well as the measures in place to ensure a safe and supportive environment for all students.

Our college has a Women Cell managed by female faculty and the governing body.
 This cell organizes special lectures, seminars, cultural programs, and meetings every academic year to empower girls and promote gender awareness.

- · The classroom offers equal opportunities to all genders.

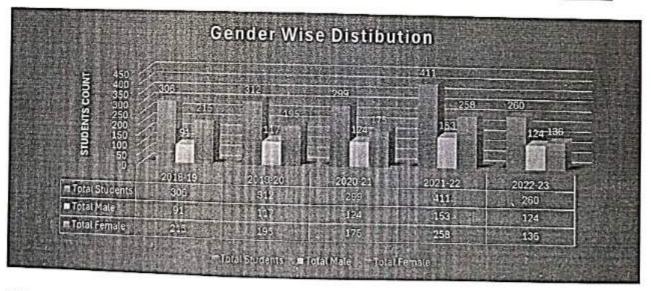
5. Complied data analysis for the session from 2018-23

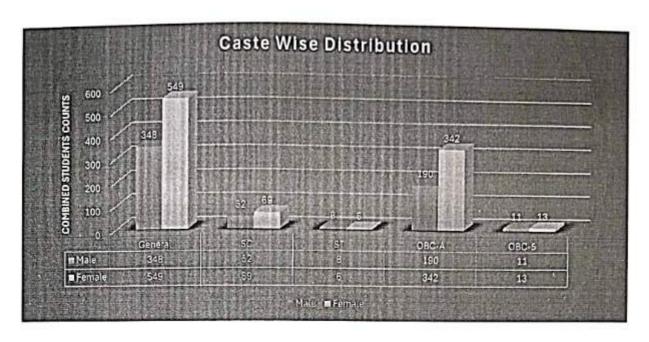

The following table shows caste wise classification of males and females students combined for all the academic years. By observing the bar graph below it seems there are more girls than boys in the General category.

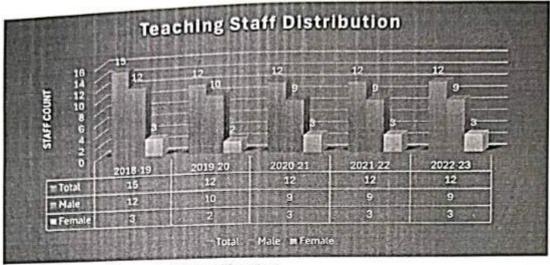

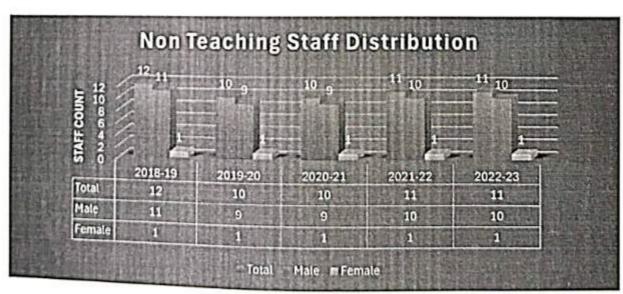

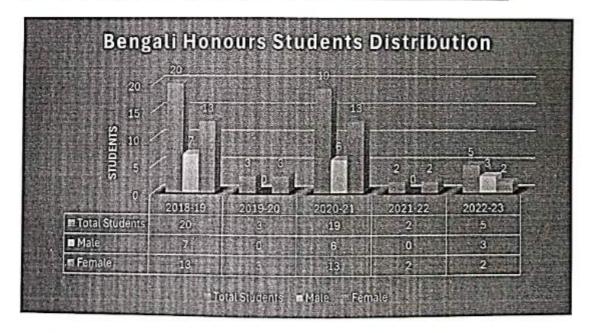

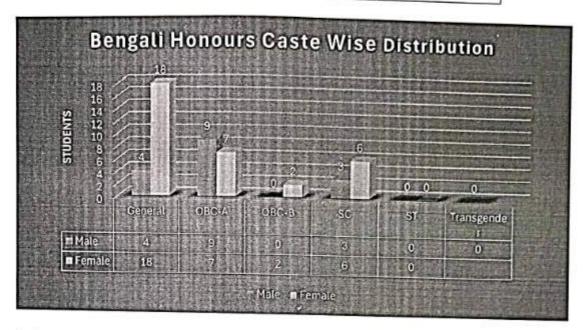

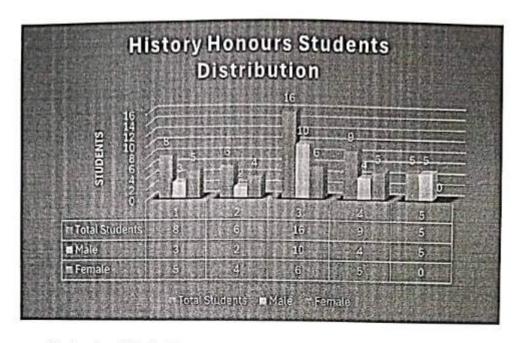

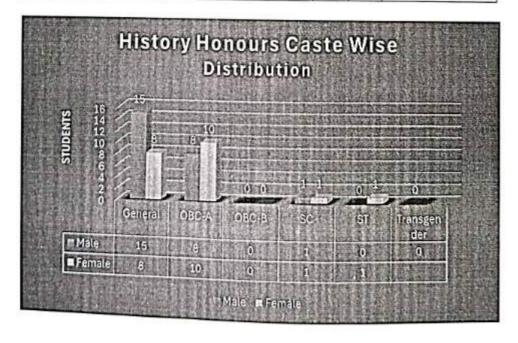

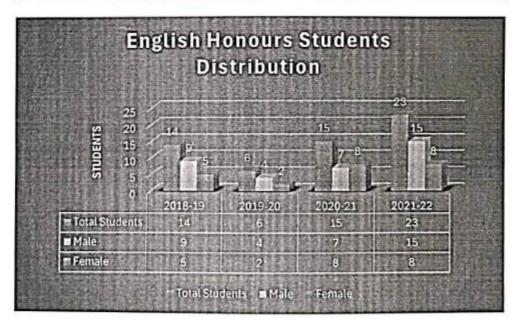

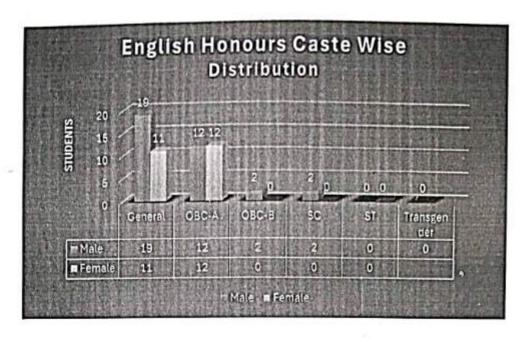

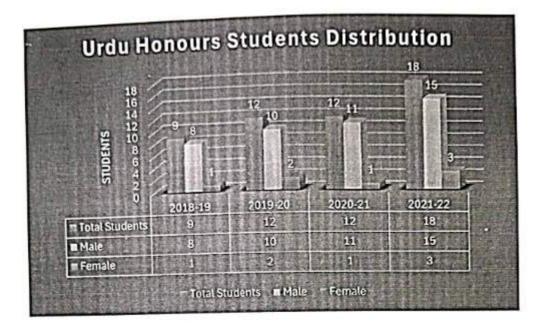

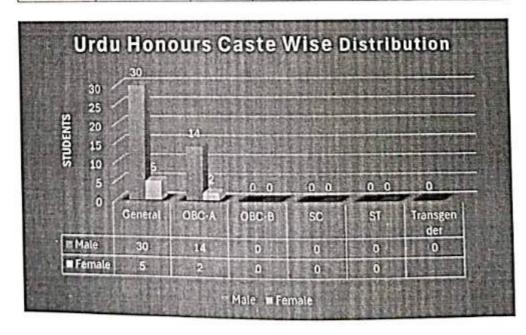

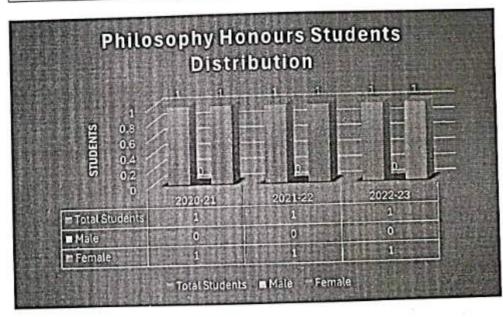

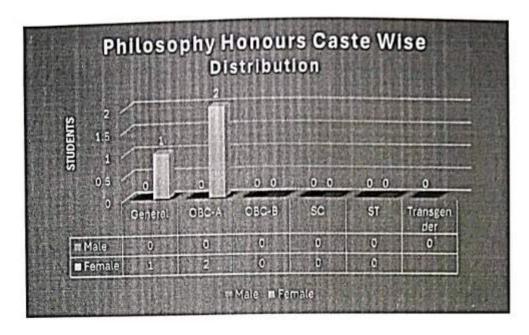

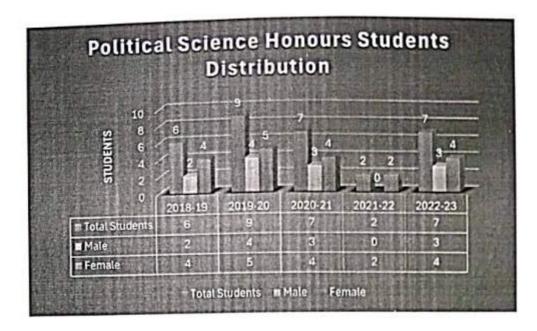

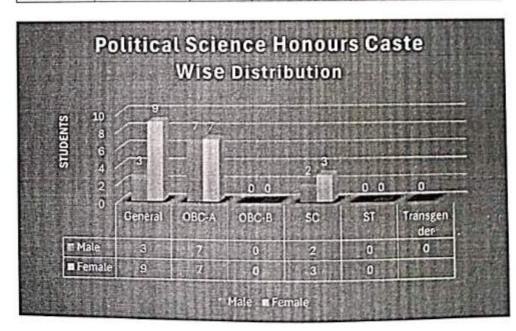
